Our curriculum and teaching materials have been integrated into many organizations in East Africa, such as the Lugarawa Health Training Institute in Lugarawa, Tanzania, or Zanzibar's First Holistic Health-Care-Center, Wajamama.

Background of the studies

In collaboration with selected partners, whose employees we have trained as RAIN WORKERS, and with whom we have been working for years in the field of community sensitization and school interventions, we conducted standardized impact studies in 2022, 2023, and 2024. The study, designed in collaboration with Ina Soth based on Phineas impact analysis, consisted of a three-part standardized questionnaire administered before, after, and three months post-interventions.

How do we measure our impact?

Changes in a society occur gradually and need time.

After an increase in knowledge, there is a shift in attitude before a change in behaviour can take place. While an increase in knowledge can be achieved relatively quickly, it often takes years if not decades for behaviour patterns to change, especially when cultural, traditional, and/or religious norms are involved.

OUR IMPACT in KENYA



Impact on communities in West-Kenya

In Kenya, our partner DESECE, Development Education Services for Community Empowerment¹ surveyed 71 beneficiaries from three women's groups and one mixed group in the Bungoma and Trans-Nzoia regions using a standardized questionnaire. The impact assessment aimed to determine how the lives, attitudes, perceptions, and couple relationships of the beneficiaries have changed. The target groups have been receiving training in reproductive health and family planning from certified RAIN WORKERS since 2015.

Change of knowledge

• 86% of the respondents understand the connection between the lack of family planning, limited resources, and poverty.

Change of attitude

- 30% of the respondents underwent HIV tests after the interventions.
- 80% of the surveyed women reported that their lives have improved compared to before, and their family cohesion has strengthened. Communication between women and men has become more open, and shared knowledge about family planning, contraception, and children's rights has led couples to discuss their concerns together.

Change of behaviour

 65% endorse (also the condom!) and use modern contraceptive methods.

Impact on Teenage mothers and in schools in Slum areas of Nairobi



Our partner MCFpanairobi² surveyed the knowledge of trained teachers in 10 schools in the Mathare slum/Nairobi where outreach is conducted by RAIN WORKERS, using a standardized questionnaire. Additionally they offer Teenage mothers a vocational education together with sexual and reproductive health.

Change of knowledge

• The knowledge of 20 teachers about sexual health has increased from 54% to 86%. They are now much better in supporting their students.

Change of behaviour

 Overall, teenage pregnancies have significantly decreased in the 10 schools. In one school (2,500 students), only one girl was pregnant last year, compared to approximately 11 pregnancies per year before the RAIN WORKER training.

20 out of 31, and 51 out of 57
 Teenage mothers in two training "kohots" started using contraceptives (IUD, injection, condom).

OUR IMPACT in TANZANIA

In Tanzania, six students from our partner organization **LUHETI, the Lugarawa Health Training Institute**, conducted a very detailed survey among 75 beneficiaries during Health Talks in three villages. The survey, led by social educator Magdalena



Liebenauer-Haschka, together with six students of midwifery, who conducted the research within their practical exercises around the villages of Lugarawa.

The interviews took place over a period of seven months during so-called health talks. The goal of the study was to determine the extent to which family planning education can positively influence families, leading to a sustainable and economically stable situation within the family.

Change of knowledge

• The village population (both women and men) showed a very high interest in family planning and sexual and reproductive health. There was a significant interest in contraceptives overall.

• Knowledge about the female menstrual cycle among men doubled through the Health Talks - from 45% initially to 92%.

Change of attitude

- Through the Health Talks in the villages, children's needs were increasingly perceived and considered. Especially the third interview shows that this perspective has indeed remained sustainably in memory: 6.8 8.2 8.5 points (out of a maximum of 10). In the first interview, 41.4% of parents could or would occasionally fulfil special requests for their children (shoes, a new dress, a football, etc.), in the third, at least 93.8%.
- The percentage of people who see a purpose in planning their family has greatly increased: from almost 53% in the first interview to over 85% in the second interview! For women, the percentage has even doubled from 44% to 89%.
- Significantly more couples discuss contraception and family planning through Health Talks. The percentage of those who did it before the health talks was 52%, in the second interview, 81% said they would, and half a year later, all (!) of the interviewees had talked to their partners about it.
- In the first interview, 47% state that they plan to have (additional) children, in the second interview, an impressive 82%, and in the third again 100% (!).
- At least 85% wanted to change something in their lives after the Health Talks, and 61% in the lives of their children. For themselves, people again divided into three-quarters into two main groups: those who wanted to start using contraceptives from now on and those who wanted to achieve a better economic status for their families (partly with and partly without concrete ideas). For their own children, about two-thirds wanted a better education so that they could have a better life and not live in poverty.

OUR IMPACT in ETHIOPIA



In Ethiopia, our longstanding partner KMG³ conducted a small survey among its 120 beneficiaries in the Kembatta region, who had been accompanied by RAIN WORKERS for six months with regular training on sexual and reproductive health and rights. The aim of the survey was to determine whether the population has a positive understanding of modern contraceptives and is now using them.

Change of behaviour

 More than 65% of beneficiarywomen in Ethiopia started using modern contraceptives after the RAIN WORKER activities, as they now understand the importance of family planning. Condoms have been destigmatized and are now being used as a method as well.
 Previously, condoms were exclusively associated with prostitution.
