

Radio Session/Update Reports in West Pokot I_REP

01 Talk 10.11.23

In today's insightful radio session, we welcomed two esteemed elders, **Mr. Musa and Mrs. Mary Lorwama**, shedding light on the origins of Female Genital Mutilation (FGM) within the Pokot community.
Fascinatingly, they revealed that the practice was adopted from neighboring nomadic pastoralist communities to safeguard women during prolonged separations from their husbands.

Originally performed on young girls marrying their peers, the narrative has taken a distressing turn, with young girls now being married off to older men due to shifting community dynamics, driven by greed and economic interests. Elders expressed concern over the illegal practice of FGM and child marriages, emphasizing the need for parents to prioritize their children's education, particularly girls.

Mrs. Lorwama, reminiscing about her upbringing, highlighted the transformation in the FGM landscape, underscoring the urgent need for change. Both elders passionately conveyed that FGM is a violation of human rights. They are actively collaborating with organizations like I_Rep Foundation to bring an end to these harmful practices in West Pokot County.

Let's join hands to amplify their message, raising awareness and advocating for the protection of children's rights. Together, we can contribute to eradicating FGM and child marriages, fostering a safer and more inclusive future for the Pokot community.

02 Talk 14.11.23

Today's radio session featured Ms. **Irene Cheruto**, our **Child Protection Officer** and frontline activist against FGM and child marriage. The community received valuable insights on various laws related to FGM, Human Rights, and child protection. 03 Talk 20.11.23

He also trains Youth on digital skills. Currently he is also the digital skills expert in charge of the government youth empowerment center in West Pokot.©

Yesterday's radio session with Siwa Steve shed light on the critical issues surrounding FGM (Female Genital Mutilation) in West Pokot county. Siwa, a passionate youth advocate and frontline activist, shared insights into the drivers of this harmful practice, as voiced by the community:

- **1. Poverty:** Economic challenges contribute to the perpetuation of FGM in West Pokot, highlighting the need for holistic development approaches to address underlying issues.
- **2. Cultural Perception:** FGM is deeply entrenched as a cultural practice, emphasizing the importance of culturally sensitive interventions that respect traditions while promoting positive change.
- **3. Women Stereotyping Fellow Women:** The role of internalized gender stereotypes in perpetuating harmful practices within the community came to the forefront, stressing the importance of empowering women to challenge and reshape these perceptions.
- **4. Peer Pressure:** Social dynamics play a significant role, with peer influence driving individuals to conform to cultural norms, showcasing the need for community-based strategies to shift social attitudes.
- **5. Lack of Education and Awareness:** A glaring gap in knowledge about the adverse effects of FGM was identified, underscoring the urgency of educational initiatives to raise awareness and promote informed decision-making.

These insights provide a comprehensive view of the challenges faced in combating FGM in West Pokot. It calls for collaborative efforts involving community leaders, educators, and advocates to address root causes and foster a safer, more informed environment for women and girls.

04 Talk 17.11.2023

05 Talk 22.11.23

Key Points Discussed:

- **1. Men's Active Role:** Emphasized the active involvement of men in the campaign against FGM and early child marriage, breaking away from passive roles.
- **2. Community Impact:** Addressed the impact of these harmful practices on the community, fostering a sense of collective responsibility.

3. Economic Implications: Explored the economic aspect, acknowledging the unintended benefits men receive and the economic consequences for the community as a whole.

06 Talk 26.11.2023
